When he died, his widow was told that she really should put an announcement in “The Times” newspaper. She enquired and found that it was quite expensive, especially if you exceeded a rather limited number of words. She thought long and hard about her dear husband, and decided on these words: “Mannie dead. Volvo for sale”.

You have to keep a sense of perspective, don't you?

The Trustees of the hall are working towards a more sustainable heating system but in the meantime they will be installing a “Heat Miser” app which makes the control of the heating in both the hall and the Ron Harris room much simpler for the caretaker.



There will be some re-decoration done in the hall in April. The dates to be confirmed when forward bookings are known. It will take 3-4 days at no cost to the Trustees.

The hall is being well used after the Christmas break with several pilates and yoga groups, short mat bowls and table tennis on a regular basis. The Village Hall web site has the bookings posted each week. See also page 33 for the exercise programme.

We are lucky to have this hall in such good shape that it can have a birthday party one day, pilates the next, Mum and Baby Postnatal Yoga and then the usual village meetings that keep us interested and informed over the month and we don't have to feed the meter with 50p's....! Our kitchen area has sufficient room to cook and heat food, and masses of plates and cups and saucers for any amount of entertaining, together with a commercial dishwasher. Instructions on how to use the machines are in the kitchen for all to use.

Fundraising will continue throughout the year so we can keep ahead of the upgrades to the various systems after 25 years of village use.

Despite the cold, wet and windy weather in January and February, there are signs that spring is on its way. We had a terrific lunch in Trattoria Spaggia on Valentine's Day when love was in the air! We started with a glass of prosecco and a cheese canapé, followed by Chicken Arabiatta with a parmesan dumpling and vegetables and then our usual spread of five puddings. It was well received and our special thanks to Anita for inviting us to use Trattoria Spaggia for our January and February lunches.



We will be back in the Village Hall for our next lunch on Friday 21 March. The tickets will be on sale from the Village Shop on Monday 3 March. Tickets cost £10 with an extra £2 to pay on the day of the lunch to save Laura the hassle of finding change in the shop. This is our 6th year of running the lunches – what a journey!

Come with a friend, be prepared to be sociable, meet new folk, enjoy a hot meal and be amazed at the variety of puddings. More importantly – no washing up.

The Community Kitchen team are all enthusiastic home cooks but we never know who has bought tickets for the lunch so we need to know your dietary concerns BEFORE the lunch. We cannot magic up a different meal on the day.



February and March are still chilly months and we need hot, varied food until the warmer weather comes. Try to think “colourful” for variety using cans of beans or packets of lentils, add to some mince or chicken and flavour with chopped herbs, lemon zest, salt & pepper. Make homemade soup out of all the wonderful local vegetables – cauliflower, beetroot, leeks, brussels sprout tops.

Grill fish with just a squeeze of lemon juice and salt and pepper and do try to avoid the “air miles” of imported soft fruit (however colourful they look!). It is the season of citrus fruit when a variety of satsumas/tangerines/clementines are in the shops all providing valuable vitamin C, along with English apples and pears. Use local shops if you are able to, likewise local butchers if you value the farmers we have in our area.

Little Lanterns have been looking at the book “Here comes Jack Frost” by Kazuno Kahara and finding out about Winter. We then worked together to make some artwork inspired by the pictures in the book.

We also had a special visit from one of Mrs Rowdon’s new lambs.

Class Challenger have been learning about the importance of our Emergency Services. This week we have been finding out about the role of Firefighters. We have drawn and painted fire engines, written about Firefighters and discussed the importance of checking our smoke alarms at home. We have learnt the number for phoning the Emergency Services.

Class Challenger have also been practising their drawing skills. They have carefully followed a tutorial and learnt how to draw a penguin.



Class Invincible have been minibeast hunters! We explored two microhabitats on our school field looking for minibeasts! We found lots of woodlouse, worms, slugs and snails. In our Science lessons we are investigating all living things in their habitats. It was a very exciting afternoon!



We have also been growing sunflowers in support of our English text “Seed to Sunflower”. We were very excited this week to have been able to watch our little seedlings growing at a rapid pace!

At Forest school, class Victory have been exploring and repairing storm damage. This has been the perfect opportunity to discuss the life cycle of trees, animal habitats and how we use wood.

Class Discovery have been busy learning about fractions in our Maths lessons and prepositional phrases in our Writing sessions.

Year 4 have been enjoying their swimming lessons, while year 5 have been evaluating a range of stuffed toys. These evaluations will support the children in

making decisions when they all create their own stuffed toys, in their Design Technology lessons.



Last month we were thrilled to have Drum Devon working with our Year 4 children. They learned the basics of drumming and spent the session creating a brilliant piece of music. The children had an amazing time, and I was so impressed with what they achieved in such a short space of time. Their final performance to their classmates was outstanding! You can find a video of their performance on our Facebook page—be sure to check it out!

In January some of our Year 6 children went to Dartmouth Academy for *Youth Speaks*. This is a public speaking competition organised by Rotary International, designed to develop young people's communication skills, including debating, presenting, and performing. I was incredibly proud of the children who represented our school with such confidence and skill. We entered four teams, and I'm thrilled to share that Stoke Fleming B team won the Dartmouth heat.

MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING OF THE PARISH COUNCIL ON WEDNESDAY 8 January 2025, AND PLANNING SITE MEETING NOTES.

Agreed and signed by the Chairman of the meeting as true and correct records

DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Cllr Bella Johnston declared an interest with respect to the Stoke Lodge planning application.

PUBLIC QUESTION TIME. Five members of the public attended to share an outline of the proposed Woodland Management Plan for Stoke Lodge which involves removal of alien species and replacement with native trees. The council was broadly in support of the proposal but highlighted dredging the pond and removal of trees threatening neighbouring properties.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT. No progress to report on devolution. The local government re-organisation will result in Devon being split into one or two unitary authorities. Future funding will be a major issue. County Elections will take place in May. County budget will be increased by 5%.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT. Proposed increase in Council tax will not cover the expected increase in National Insurance costs. Parking charges will be increased. Following an incident at Little Cotton leading to a suspect being arrested, the District Councillor and MP attended to reassure residents. The Police will lead a multi-agency response to ensure the matter is resolved. Applications have been made to the District Locality fund by the Village Hall Trustees and the revamped village magazine. The need for dog waste bins on Little Cotton will be further raised with SHDC but funding is an issue.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

a) Proposed new car park - dialogue with the landowner continues.

FUNDRAISING AND VOLUNTEERING sub-committee report

- a) Toilets – School Road. Purchase is in progress; meters have been read.

Nature Notes

A dipper flew out of the bushes onto the Combe Pond water near the island but did not go under at 17.00 on 5 February. It was on the water surface for several minutes but flew away to the trees alongside the stream nearby. At 17.30 I saw a little grebe again and two couples of mallards. An hour before I saw a little egret in one pool at Riversbridge, and four “bachelor” drakes in another pool.

I saw another egret in the horses’ field next to the A379 near the new houses on 30 January. They could also be in cows’ field as well, like the one in the outskirts of Townstal near the River Dart. The coal tit was seen until 25 January when I completed the RSPB Big Bird Watch, but the male blackcap is still there in my garden. Also the grey squirrel came to my garden on 28 January and 9 February diving into the ivy.

Also in my garden I saw a female great spotted woodpecker and six long-tailed tits on 12 January at about lunchtime. I saw five long-tailed tits at the entrance of Rock Vale, Redlap Lane, and three more from Redlap on 24 January. I saw a fieldfare on the branches near the horses’ field as well.



On 20 January I saw a peregrine falcon hunting over the sea at Warren Cove, Little Dartmouth and on 3 February two buzzards over the same sea-coast. The male kestrel was there each time hovering but inland. The jackdaws mobbed the kestrels a lot but there are no jackdaws at Little Dartmouth and Cotton.

Prickles in a Pickle

I thought last year flew by quickly, but I think this one is going by even faster! January and February are always our quieter months but even so we are up on numbers from last year. Do not be fooled, this is not a good thing at all. It is just a reflection of how bad we have made things for our wildlife. Even earlier than last year, we have already had prickly patients with severe strimmer injuries, including one that had both her back legs strimmed off. She was only a juvenile, probably born in November and had not even reached breeding age.



Hedgehogs have now been added to the red list of endangered and “threatened with extinction” animals, we have lost 98% of them leaving us with a small gene pool and even more difficulties for them to overcome. Urban hedgehogs have slowed their decline and research shows this is due to traffic calming schemes, linked gardens and people learning to live with and encourage and nurture the nature around them.

We are booking talks and events for the coming year; we have had more volunteers join us and we are still looking for weekend help, a Friday evening feeder and a washer-up most mornings except Mondays and Thursdays. Come along and meet us and the prickly patients. Training is given and you will meet a lovely bunch of people.

Lots of hedgehogs have been released over the past two weeks and there are reports of them being seen regularly on camera. Wildlife cameras are now very cheap and cheerful and can give you some interesting feedback of what is going on in your gardens, people soon become quite hooked and end up buying more!

Thank-you to all of you bringing donations but please, check with us first that it is something we actually need or use. We have had some odd and unusable items left in the garage which we then have to take to the recycling centre or put in our bin. For the hedgehogs we welcome newspapers, (no magazines or junk mail), washing up liquid, floor cleaner, kitten biscuits, Sainsburys tinned puppy food, puppy pads, kitchen roll; and for our volunteers: tea, coffee and biscuits.

Alan and I were invited to “The Newt” in Somerset, all expenses paid, to look at their red squirrel enclosure. They want to use it for some of our unreleasable hedgehogs. The red squirrels will be there as well, as part of the re-introduction programme going on around the country. We had a guided tour, it is too big to see in one visit or even two or three! The enclosure is managed on an organic and no dig practice based on Charles Dowding's studies and ethos. “The Newt” is a huge rewilding programme with 450 staff, 200 acres and a plant based restaurant. We were “wined and dined” by the head gardener, Harry, and the

entomologist, Tom, who invited us. They have a national collection of apple trees there and a cider orchard that supplies their microbrewery for making dessert wine, cider and apple champagne. We had the latter with our dinner, and suffice to say, although I have two knee replacements, it made them wobble after half a glass! The menu is plant-based but you can have a side order of home-produced lamb, beef, venison or buffalo halloumi. Look it all up on the internet and book a visit; absolutely amazing!

We have now taken more than 60 Duke of Edinburgh students here for their bronze, silver and gold awards. We also have several work placements booked throughout the year. This is always good fun and helps to spread awareness of how our British wildlife needs our help.

Nice to see the countryside waking up for spring, always an uplift for the soul.

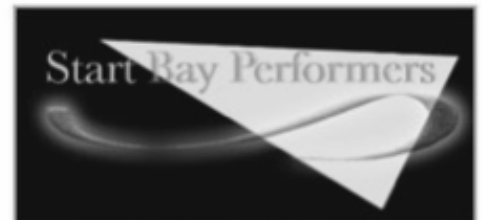

New servery and disabled toilet gets the go-ahead

Additions to church buildings must quite rightly go through a rigorous planning and approval system, and we are all delighted to have heard recently that all permissions have now been granted.



The new facilities are urgently needed, especially the disabled toilet and baby changing area. To create the serving area some pews will be removed from the back of the church and a main serving part of the kitchen will be installed there. Meanwhile in the existing kitchen area a larger toilet will be created with a wide doorway and changing facilities for babies and toddlers. In the newly refurbished "washing up area" a professional dishwasher, new sink and water heater plus new window will be installed. The door from the washing up area to the new servery will be removed and a wider entrance created. The work will all be in keeping with our beautiful, Grade 2 listed church.



Three of FoSP's committee members, Jenny Farmer, Annie Worsfold and David Holmes, will be working with the Rev Matt Gorton and PCC members to apply for grants with the aim of raising the remaining money needed to complete the work.
