A Reader's View: Second Home Owners' Access to "The Voice"

The Voice is a great place to discover what is available and what is going on in Stoke Fleming. Unfortunately, the current policy is that only permanent residents receive a free copy of The Voice, and does not include second home owners.

These owners pay twice the community charge that residents do. This in turn will provide twice the contribution to Stoke Fleming Parish Council that residents do. As the Parish Council donates money to The Voice it can be argued that second home owners are actually paying money towards the magazine anyway.

It is likely that second home owners and holiday makers will spend more than 65p per visit to the village, the cost of producing a copy of The Voice. Allowing second home owners a free copy of The Voice can only be a win for the village.

However, we know many permanent residents spend much of the year away too, and so won't use all their copies either. Therefore, this is something we want to look at.

Doing this will take time – firstly, to review the matter and also to identify how many second homes we have, what the costs involved in delivering to them, and whether we have the finances we need to respond. In the meantime, copies can be obtained for a donation from the shop.

From the Rectory

The recent spate of good weather, and an upcoming 15th birthday for someone, meant I no longer had an excuse to not cut the grass in the garden. Now to me it didn't seem too bad; I'd watched it each day get fractionally taller, but as I contemplated cutting the grass I started to grasp the enormity of the situation as Heidi (our cockapoo) had disappeared into the grass which was normal, but so had her black labrador friend who was over at ours, who being at least twice the size of Heidi had also disappeared!

Needless to say, over the space of a week, and about 20 hours of graft, the grass was cut and the garden is usable for the summer. But as I toiled away it got me to thinking (especially as I had more than enough time to do a bit of that!) so often changes are minute and almost unnoticeable especially when we face them each day. Hair growing longer, washing pile getting larger, children getting taller and so on.

It's not until we distance ourselves from something, such as a child we haven't seen in a year, that the cliché comments along the lines of "oh haven't you changed!" make an appearance. But the reality is it's true; sometimes we are just too close to a situation to realise when a change is happening. This is why, in films when the main character goes on a mission to change, it is usually depicted by a 30 second montage meant to represent a longer period of time. This is because change is gradual.

Just like faith. Our relationship with God isn't a ten-step programme or 100 hour commitment that, upon completion, means we fully understand who he is. Because the reality is we get to understand who God is more through the little things, reading the Bible, praying, spending time with others. Our faith is like our childhood development, we don't feel like we are getting anywhere or growing quickly enough. But other people will notice and comment. So it is with our faith. We need to give it time, have patience and persevere, then people will start to notice a change, a change that almost can't be articulated because it's God's presence with us through the Holy Spirit which is what we celebrate at Pentecost. Will you commit to seeing what God may have in store for you? I know I have in the past, I still do today and will always do, because the only finish line is our time on this earth before it all makes sense in the beauty of eternity. Sounds like it's worth a go to me, what about you?

Shirley Ruddlesden (1958-2025)



Most people in the village knew Shirley, who died at home on 1st May after a short illness. Originally a Brixham girl, she became one of the “stalwarts” in Stoke Fleming, having moved to the village in 1991 when she married Chris Ruddlesden (another well-known village “character”, who sadly died in 2022). When she first came she was working in HSBC and latterly in Pillars in Dartmouth, but after she retired she threw herself into village life, taking on the role of secretary of the Hort & Sport Society from Joan Mason and running the Christmas Tree Festival, firstly with Rokie Shiffner, and later with Caroline Martin.

She organised the Hort & Sport Show with her usual quiet efficiency, working so hard to make the Show what it is today – an afternoon of village enjoyment with ruthless contests over growing, flower arranging and baking, as well as the arts and crafts competitions. She managed the award of cups galore, all shining and

engraved, and she provided such comprehensive notes on how it all worked. It is indeed a Village Show to be proud of.

In 2024 Shirley completed her 10th Christmas Tree Festival. She really loved the Festival and always said that one of the best parts was seeing the look on people’s faces when they came into the church and she was truly delighted at how creative the sponsors continued to be each year. She loved the comments and the smiles, and the look of concentration as the Spot the Oddity forms were completed. The most important thing to her was how it brought people together. Everyone will miss her attention to detail, her enthusiastic presence and guiding hand.

As well as these major activities, Shirley actively supported many other organisations, including the Community Kitchen lunches, Rowcroft, Prickles in a Pickle and the annual poppy collections. She delivered the magazines in Rectory Lane and Bailey’s Meadow every month and acted as Auditor for the previous Stoke Fleming Magazine team for many years. A keen gardener, she also regularly volunteered in the gardens at Coleton Fishacre.

Shirley was the most practical, thoughtful, kindest person with a wicked sense of humour. A truly remarkable lady who was much loved and will be sorely missed in Stoke Fleming, as other tributes in this magazine will attest.

Summer is here at last!

We've been waiting a long time for June to arrive: the slow build of blossom through March and April reached a crescendo in the peonies and irises of May, and now the garden has burst into glorious life; every leaf, rosebud and delphinium spire stretching happily towards the sun.



Gardentime's Top 10 June garden jobs

1. Run a Dutch hoe over your beds to cut down annual weeds before they set seed. Ideally, do this on a dry day so that the weeds shrivel and dry up in the sun.
2. Be waterwise – if you need to water, do it in the early morning or evening.
3. Mulch! Apply a layer of organic mulch around plants to conserve moisture, suppress weeds, and regulate soil temperature. Mulching not only helps retain moisture during the hot summer months but also improves soil structure and fertility as it decomposes over time.
4. Mow your lawn once a week. During dry periods, mow on a higher setting.
5. Watch out for aphids and slugs – remove them by hand if possible, remember not to spray when bees are active during the day.
6. Pinch out the growing tips of fuchsias to encourage bushy plants.
7. Stake tall plants.
8. Cut back the leaves of spring bulbs like daffodils and tulips once they have turned yellow.
9. Deadhead roses and pick sweet peas to encourage them to keep flowering.
10. Clip privet, box and yew hedges (provided no birds are nesting in them).

Whether you're in the mood for planting up vibrant pots, pottering around the borders, or simply soaking up the sunshine with a coffee in hand, we've got everything you need at Gardentime this summer.

Nature Notes

A hobby from the falcon family and a summer visitor was seen with a dozen swallows on 30th April in a field next to the new Cotton Pond, Venn Lane. Also I saw a male kestrel nearby on a telegraph pole on 19th April. At about 9pm on 24th April I saw a Leisler's Bat near the cowshed next to Venn Lane, Cotton. On 8th May I saw a few house martins for the first time this year with a dozen swallows over Cotton Track. The sixth summer visitors are swifts on 13th May at the bird feeding corner of Slapton Ley, Torcross, and possibly one flew over the bungalows near Venn Lane on 15th May.

On the National Trust coast path, Little Dartmouth, I saw a raven near to the track and chiffchaffs near to the sea on 14th May. A pair of circl buntings were seen with a pair of chaffinches near Pine Wood, off Ash Lane, on 29th April. A little grebe was seen at Combe Pond on the same day. Near Bowden House I found a young grass snake killed by vehicles. There are no barn owls and little owls present in Stoke Fleming now, just tawny owls. One year ago I thought I saw a barn owl during daylight over the A379 at Deer Park but it was probably a little egret from the horses' field with the neck back and the legs forward in flight.

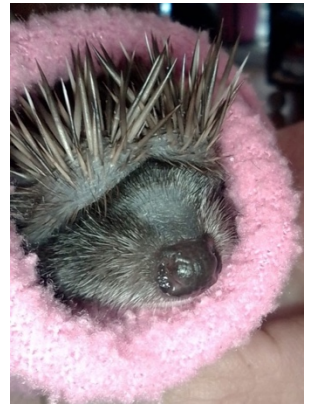

Prickles in a Pickle

Before we update you with all things prickly we would just like to say how saddened we are by the passing of Shirley Ruddlesden. Shirley was a huge supporter of PIAP and very patient with our usual tardiness in sending in application forms! We send love to her family and friends; she will leave a massive gap in village life and in all our hearts.



We would like to thank the Loam Rangers for their welcome donation of £250 for the purchase of another tumble dryer. We also received a donation of £1,000 and the wonderful people who donated this wish to remain anonymous. Thank you.

So far, a quieter start to the year but we have taken in 130 hedgehogs, each one is triaged, given first aid, stabilised, veterinary help if needed and once strong enough given to a specific available rehabber.

Sadly, the main issues causing our hedgehog patients distress are poisoning and strimmers. Every year we give out information about strimmers. PLEASE check the area you are about to strim before you start. “No mow May” is a good idea in principle but much better to leave a few wild areas in the garden and regularly cut the area you want to keep tidy.

If you have pest control please check that the poison being used does not have a secondary life. Any other creature eating the carrion or rodent, still barely living will die too, this will include owls and other raptors, foxes, badgers and hedgehogs and of course your cat or dog.

We have had several adult hedgehogs in with severe leg injuries to front feet and legs due to the plastic “snap traps” a lot of people are using for rats and mice. These casualties often have to be “pts” as the infection is so severe it has infected bone or caused a compound fracture. These traps are absolutely lethal to hedgehogs.

One of our trustees and fundraisers, Janice, has been revving up our Instagram presence. Janice has been using pictures and film that we take while looking after the hedgehogs. She then puts them to music; it’s been very entertaining! Take a look.

Thank you for the donations they are all very welcome; we have a high demand for kitchen roll and steriliser tablets as well as Sainsbury’s tinned puppy food and Purina kitten biscuits.

We also need some extra help over the weekends and some washer uppers. Come along and meet us. Sadly no one under the age of 14.

Latest News from Stoke Fleming Primary School

At the beginning of this term, we were delighted to welcome representatives from the RNLI who led a special assembly all about staying safe at the beach. The children impressed us with how much they already knew, and the session was a timely reminder of the importance of water safety—especially living in such a beautiful coastal area.



The children in Little Lanterns this half term have been looking at a range of topics, starting with “The Very Hungry Caterpillar”. The last half term before we break for the summer holidays on Friday 18th is always packed with lots of fun and exciting activities – School Sports Day, visits to Blackpool Sands, Sailing Days at the RDYC for year 6. The last week of term the year 6 children will perform their leavers play at the village hall, then in school on the last day they will have their leavers assembly, we wish them all the best for their next adventure in their new schools.
